Azusa Street Outpouring The Great Earthquake At almost precisely 5:12 am, local time, on April 18, 1906, an earthquake foreshock rudely awakened San Francisco Bay Area residents and it was followed by a massive earthquake about 20 to 25 seconds later, with its epicentre near San Francisco

The Function and Practice of Fasting in Early Pentecostalism

Corporate fasting included the days of fasting preceding the Azusa St revival (Seymour 1906a:1), and subsequent special fast days at the Mission (Scott 1907:2) Before conventions and other meetings, churches and denominations would call upon their constituents to fast (Buckalew 1914:8) AM Flowers urged the entire Church to fast
